Dear Parents,

In the first week of September, your student will be learning to play/study the history of the recorder during music class! The recorder is a woodwind instrument played by blowing a thin stream of air through the instrument mouthpiece and placing the fingers over the holes.

Our recorder unit is set to begin the week of <u>September 2-6</u>. Students must obtain a recorder prior to this date in order to participate during music class. Recorders may be purchased from a music store, I have listed local music stores on the back of this page. Recorders purchased from outside sources (Ex:Amazon) must be Baroque Soprano Recorders (no German style!). There are many brands of Recorders to choose from, the main thing to remember is the recorder needs to be a Baroque Soprano Recorder (sometimes they are listed as just Soprano). I have a list of 3 examples below:

- Yamaha YRS24B Soprano Recorder
- Angel 101 Soprano Recorder, Key of C
- Lyons Soprano Recorder

Please avoid purchasing cheap plastic, colored recorders from discount stores such as the Dollar Store, Walmart, Costco, Kohl's, etc. The instruments found in these stores are often poor quality and do not play or allow the student to play as well as they could. Oftentimes the tone holes (the holes students put their fingers on to play a note) on these cheaper instruments are misplaced or incorrect. These types of recorders will not help your student learn or be able to play the recorder correctly.

We do have a class set of recorders for students who forget their instrument at home, who don't have their instrument yet, or were not able to purchase an instrument. These instruments are washed after every use, they are not recorders the students can take home because they are used by multiple classes. The class set of recorders are just a spare set that students may use if they need to and stay at the school campus.

Occasionally I hand out recorder music or offer music for students who would like to practice at home. If you think your student would like to take the music I hand out you might consider a music folder (a paper folder) for your student to store their music in.

When you purchase your recorder, they should come in a case. It's important to label your child's information on the recorder case. This is just in case the instrument is lost, if it's returned to the office the staff would know who the instrument belongs to. Here's an example for labeling the case:

## Name Parent Contact number or email Classroom number or classroom teacher's name

Once our recorder unit has started, the students will learn a few basic notes, how to read music, practicing expectations, and about instrument cleaning/care. Please encourage your

student to share with you what they have learned in class. Recorders are a great starting instrument for learning the basics for other instruments like the flute, clarinet, and trumpet; as well as how to read music which all instrument types do. I hope you enjoy hearing what your student learns on the recorder.
